
Corporal Work of Mercy: Feed The Hungry



Then on their way out, they dropped off a few select non-perishable items into a cart, which we transferred into my car totalling over 1300 lbs of groceries. By the time the three hours were up, we had completely filled up my Mom's car from the back of the trunk, to the driver's seat. We all had a great time doing the project and most importantly we were able to help those who are hungry in Hunterdon County. Matter of fact, we were able to collect 1,325 lbs of nonperishable food for the homeless and hungry. That is over a half a ton of food.

Pictures of of the donated groceries filling the entire back half of my car.


